

Lifeboat day this year was held on a Sunday and proved to be very successful. A large increase in the number of visitors made the day one of the best in the history of of Porthleven's lifeboat day. which commenced in 1976. The amount raised for the RNLI was £3259 the third largest amount recorded. 1986 and 1987 being the largest years on record

Many of our local traders had a very good trading day thanks to the work of the Lifeboat Committee.

Early in September Porthleven experienced a hoax shout. The SAR helicopter was scrambled from RNAS Culdrose and the Penlee lifeboat arrived in the outer harbour. The search apparently lasted approximately 90 minutes. Whilst this was a waste of time and resources. It does give some comfort to know that we have this rescue service. It proves that our fund raising lifeboat day plays a large part in supporting the service which any one of us may need as long as we live and work with the sea. Thank you for your generous support one again this year.

Battle of 20 years set to pay off

ORK to provide long-awaited sewage treatment works for Porthleven remains on schedule - in fact, ahead of it - and should be in operation by the time of next year's holiday season.

Construction work is currently under way on land in the Treza Valley, and is reward for locals who who have been battling for improved sewerage systems in the port for more than 20 years.

Giles Oliver, of consultant engineers Montgomer Watson, which is overseeing the multi-thousand pound scheme, said about 20 people were currently working on the site for con-tractors M J Gleeson. Construction work began at the end of July, and Mr Oliver said that the dry weather during the past few weeks had been partly responsible for the good progress made so far on the project.

The sewage works are being built to a plan approved by county planners

earlier this year. At one stage it was feared work would be held up when South West Water submitted an amended design.

However, public objection was strong enough to persuade the com-pany to eventually revert back to the original.

Did strange lights precede county's biggest shock wave for 30 years?

SUNDAY'S incident was by no means the first time the earth has moved for Cornish folk.

The British Geological Survey in Edinburgh have records showing a much stronger quake in 1757, which measured 4.4 on the Richter scale and had its epicentre about 12 miles north east of that on Sunday.

The BGS said the largest of many "events" with epicentres in the Helston/Constantine area occurred in 1966 and was felt as far away as the Isles of Scilly, with faint traces in Exeter. That measured 4.1 on the Richter scale.

The most recent "big" tremer was in 1981. Again, it affected Helston and Constantine in particular and caused some damage. Its strength was recorded at 3.5.

strength was recorded at 3.5. Sunday's earthquake came just a week after a Channel 4 television documentary, Equivor, investigated an alleged link between mystery lights in the sky, which were shortly followed by earthquakes. There were reports on local television last week of strange lights over Helston, Camborne and the north coast.

The epicentre on Sunday was in Mount's Bay, but the shock was felt throughout a large area of Cornwall.

Graham Williams, of Porthleven, said he heard – and felt – a loud rumbling. "It seemed to come in from the back field... I honestly thought it was an explosion."

He went out into Gibson Way to see what was happening, as did many neighbours. Another Porthleven resident,

Peter Hichens, of Gibson Way, was in the Harbour Inn drinking coffee. "The windows rattled and the floorboards shook.

"Dust came down from the beams," he said. When he stood up, the tremor went through him. It looked as if granite posts were moving

moving. When it stopped, there was a deathly silence outside. "The

whole population of seagulls sud-denly went up into the air, screech-ing all around the harbour."

THERE have been three fur-ther tremors in Cornwall since Sunday's "earthquake", which shook walls and led to dozens of worried calls to the police.

However, scientists at the British Geological Survey in Edinburgh said that three later tremors were not of a magnitude the general public would detect.

But they want to hear about peo-ple's experiences of the main tremor, which took place at 9.30am on Sunday and was the biggest in the area for many years.

It measured 3.8 on the Richter scale; secondary tremors ranged from about 1.1 to 0.1 in magnitude. The BGS are asking people to

Mr Henni added it was not possi-ble to say whether there would be further major tremors in the next few weeks. Each year in the UK, there was an average of 300 tremors of varying magnitudes.



Weaving an Arabian fantasy

PORTHLEVEN basketmaker Geraldine Jones is on a high - a Kneehigh, in fact!

For a number of her baskets are currently being used in Kneehigh Theatre's summer production of The Arabian Nights, which has just fin-ished a run at Nottingham Playhouse and is due to re-open as an open-air show at Bedford Hotel Gardens, Tavistock, later this month, before summer appearmonth, before summer appear-ances throughout the South West, including at The Minack.

The show's artistic director, Bill Mitchell, was searching for a basket for his genie, and found the perfect answer in Porthleven.

That is where he discovered Geraldine, who makes and displays traditional and unexpected baskets at her Salt Cellar Workshops on the harbourside.

Once he saw her work, he commissioned her to produce several colourful and exotic baskets for the production.

Geraldine has been practising basketry since 1980, her first teacher being Tom Aldridge, an elderly man from a family of gypsy basketmak-ers. Since then, she has run work-shops on basketry, held willow hut-making events at fairs, been commissioned by film makers, interior designers, and, more recently, of course, Kneehigh.

She was "basketmaker in residence" on board the SS Advance during the last Brest Boat Festival.

She settled in Cornwall 15 years ago and she and her husband live at Rosudgeon.

Prior to moving to Cornwall, they travelled constantly as a family throughout England and abroad.

"I find willow weaving and basketry constantly exciting from both the creative and research aspects, and feel that it is an underestimated art form.

"It could well have been the very first creative expression of prehis-toric man and woman, and has probably played a far more important role in the history of art than is gen-erally recognised," she said.

PORTHLEVEN MILLENNIUM TRUST

No doubt you will have heard that the village failed in its attempt to get Millennium Commission funding. This was a great disappointment to all those who had worked hard to prepare the documentation for the application.

However, when writing to the Porthleven Committee, Michael O'Connor, acting Chief Executive of the Millennium Commission said that, "....your application met out key oriteria for millennium projects, but was not judged to have as distinctive an impact as others we received ... We do hope that the momentum you have built up, and the partnership support you have identified, can help your project, or part of it, progress."

FINANCIAL SUPPORT BY LOCAL BUSINESSMAN - since learning that the Millennium bid was refused on the 31st January, 1997, restaurateur Steve Critchard has kindly given the Trust Committee £500 to finance further research into obtaining alternative funding. **QUEST FOR FUNDING CONTINUES** - there are funds available that will allow us to improve the overall environment of the village. But what has to be decided is, what parts of the original plan should we now proceed with.

First, we should define a new strategy by commissioning a Civic Trust report, in conjunction with the Harbour & Dock Co., District and County councils. While this is in progress, we can move ahead on non-strategic projects, most of which fall under the title of environmental improvements. This can be achieved by writing formally to Kerrier DC asking for partnership help on the *first phase* of environmental projects, implementing them as funds are wor.

Before we can pursue and win funding on the *strategic projects* as a *second phase*, we have to firmly establish the partnership between the Trust and the Harbour & Dock Co., so that we can demonstrate there is a common vision of the strategy being pursued. This is essential, as the Harbour & Dock Co., is a key player in helping to both define its own long term intentions, and in forging a partnership with the County and District and others, to implement the strategic province.

FUNDING RULES - each potential fund has different 'rules'. Deadlines vary. Requirements for matched funding vary. Upper and lower limits of project costs vary. The percentage of aid available varies. So a lot of work has to be done deciding whether for example, "Do the characteristics of any on particular project fit the criteria of the fund being applied to?" "Is it the most likely source of aid?" "Will that still be true when we apply?" "Can the partnership necessary for a successful application be put together in advance?" We have to be aware that the goalposts move. Therefore expert advice on an "as needed" basis is likely to continue to henceful

PROJECTS THAT HAVE BEEN IDENTIFIED - show that Environmental projects, which remeasest 7002 at 1 and

which represent 78% of the total work envisaged, accounts for 25% of the cost; and that Strategic projects, which represent 22% of the total work planned, accounts for 75% of the costs.

ENVIRONMENTAL PROJECTS -include, harbour roads, areas by the Harbour Hotel, harbour head, old timber yard, public seating, litter bins, area by the lime kiln, open areas, play areas, Gala Parc, pier signs/railings, exterior of lifeboat house, Victorian street lights, beach entrance, railings/fences/paths/walls, signposting, senior citizens shelter, Gravesend, Frankies.

STRATEGIC PROJECTS -include, Sea Life Centre, Overhead Cables, Ship Repair, Youth Club, Community Centre, Health Club, Gig Club, Inner Harbour, Baulks, Lime Kiln Preservation..

PROSPECTS - remember there are many avenues to be explored for funding. Most schemes are candidates for ERDF funding under measure 4.1. This runs to December, '99 and can provide 50% funding. On land reclamation projects, funding may derive from English Partnerships. The District and County Councils may be supportive in addition to those just mentioned.


Gala Parc may attract Lotteries Sports Funding, as might the Gig Club and other recreational needs. Public toilets are a statutory provision, so only signposting will attract outside funds. With regards to railings, fences and walls, routine maintenance would not attract funds. Repairs will! Lottery charity funds might be supportive to the Youth Centre. Cornwall has applied for Objective 1 funds, (similar to that available to the Highlands and Merseyside), these provide 75% funding.

He gave a very informative report and started by saying how very pleased he was to have the chance to visit

Porthleven and endorsed the previous statement that the year had financially been very successful. His thanks went to all supporters of Porthleven and District branch. Of all the monies raised by the branches of RNLI, 19% of it was raised in the South West.

This year's spending will be \$70m, \$3m above budget, due to several new Trent and Severn boats coming on station.

The RNLI receive more legacy money than any other charity, some \$39m. It is estimated that some five million people go out in boats at sea but just 250,000 of them are members of Shoreline.

Apologies must go to any householders living in Cornwall who received a letter worded "as a Devonian living in Devon would you please help the RNLI" – this wording was a mistake and should never have been sent to Cornish homes.

In recent years an annual draw has been held offering a Volvo car as a prize. It is time for a change and it has been decided to offer, instead, holiday vouchers for \$5,000, which will include \$1,000 spending money.

Tickets will be available any time now. A concert is planned, featuring Peter Skellern, to be held in June at Grampound Road, again in aid of RNLI funds.

All members of the committee were prepared to serve another year but two members exchanged positions. Joan Carter, who has been souvenir secretary, changed with Pat Adams, who has been her assistant.

She is now waiting to hear how much the cash prize is worth.





FOUR cycling members of Helston Lizard Inner Wheel Club will be switching from leafy Cornish lanes to the heat and dust of India.

Wendy Wallis and Ase Smith, of Helston, and Angela Dawson and Ann Russell, of Porthleven, are getting fit to tackle 400 miles in January, raising funds for Lepra – the charity concerned with leprosy.

The four, who enjoy cycling, are pleased at the way sponsorship is coming in for their marathon, which will cover 10 cycling days, with more than 60 miles on some of them.

They pay their own fares and expenses, and every penny raised goes to the charity.

Farmer's wife Mrs Wallis said they were doing the cycle ride after reading about it in *The West Briton*.

"I thought I would like to do it," she said, "it will certainly be an experience of a lifetime."

The four fly out from Heathrow to Calcutta, on Janury 24. Then follows a six-hour train journey to Bhubaneshwar and a twohour bus ride into the mountains to start the ride.

"It is a part of India that is not available to tourists," Mrs Wallis said. "It is where leprosy is more rampant, and where Lepra has many centres." The cycle route circles the Khondmal hills.

Just in from a 40-mile tone-up ride, Mrs Wallis said she had been cyclng for many years and now rode a hybrid bike with 21 gears.

Mrs Smith, and her husband, a local doctor, have been to India, but only on holiday. Mrs Dawson, whose husband is also a farmer, is the Inner Wheel overseas fund-raising chairman. Mrs Wallis and Mrs Russell are past presidents.

Mrs Wallis, who lives at Penventon Farm, Helston, said the four would be happy to receive donations or pledges.



FIVE women in training for a charity cycling marathon in India in January are close to reaching their fund-raising target.

Wendy Wallis, Angela Dawson, Ann Russell and Ase Smith, who all live at Porthleven, and Sue Baker, of Breage, are among 30 volunteers taking part in the gruelling trek, organised by Lepra, the British Leprosy Association.

Each has to raise £1,050 for the charity's work, plus £750 as an entry fee for the cycle ride.

Around 40 friends and relations of the five sat down to a fund-raising meal at the Lugger Inn, Porthleven.

Angela said: "I was talking to Ian Greaves at the Lugger about Lepra, and he said he'd like to do something to help, which was lovely."

The meal was just the latest in a series of events she and her fellow cyclists have held in and around Porthleven, including car boot sales, barbecues at caravan sites, a coffee morning, a disco evening and a barn dance.

"People have been ever so good," she said. 'We've had a great response.'

A shared love of cycling brought the women together, and when Wendy signed up for the Lepra trip, the other four were quick to follow her example.

But they are well aware that the expedition will be rather more demanding than their usual jaunts round the Cornish countryside.

"We're all training hard, and before we go, we'll have to do several long days to prepare ourselves," said Angela. "Once we're in India, we'll be doing 12 miles on the first day, 60 on the next two, and 45-50 on the other seven." The volunteers will spend some nights camp-

ing and others in Lepra hospitals, where they will be able to see first-hand the work the charity is doing to cure and treat leprosy victims.

A 19-YEAR-OLD Porthleven girl has been accepted as a volunteer on a project to bring education to children and adults in one of the poorest countries in Central America

Helen Quick is currently studying for A Levels and working as an assis-tant at Manaccan Primary School – but this time next year she will be a teacher in Honduras, where 60 per cent of the population is illiterate.

Helen's placement has been arranged by the Project Trust, an educational charity which gives young volunteers the chance to gain a wider understanding of the different cultures of the world while working on practical projects.

But Helen is also excited about what she is sure will be a great adventure. "I love seeing new sights," she said, "And I've had won-derful reports from friends who have already been off travelling."

Following her application to the


MEMBERS of Porthleven Town Band have the unanimous support of the town council for their plans to install a toilet and wardrobe cum equipment store at the bandroom.

Mr Palmer paid his respects to local builder John Perkins and his son Michael, who braved the storms to make emergency repairs to the holiday flats. "He came out within half-an-hour and was a hero," said Mr Palmer.

Tiles were ripped from the Sunday School roof, a chimney pot came off and the roof was damaged at a property in St Thomas Street. Cliff Road was closed as pensioner Denis Giles, of Glendene, had his roof ripped off. Cars were evacuated from Commercial Road, St Keverne, on Sunday when at the height of the storm a large part of the roof was ripped from the Old Post Office, home of St Keverne fire officer Dave Smith and his family.

Sue Smith said: "I was dishing up lunch when I heard an unholy crash. The winds had lifted the tiles and smashed them into the greenhouse and out into the road, where a lot of cars were parked." Mrs Smith, whose husband was on duty, called the fire brigade to take charge of the situation as slates and timber were flying down the road

Another house in the same road also lost part of its roof as gale force winds continued to buffet the





Doctor reminisces on 26 years' service

RETIRED family doctor Ken Whittle has described his 26year stint at Porthleven surgery as a "near-perfect experience".

Dr Whittle, who enjoyed a preat the town's public hall last week, reflected on his time there in an interview with *The Helston* and Lizard Briton.

"I have found life in Cornwall very interesting, but difficult to anticipate. The Cornish are inde-pendent, they are their own peo-ple, and I have had some marvellous times and experiences work-ing with them," said the 53-year-old, who lives at Ashton.

He said that practising never became boring because of its unpredictable nature, and added that there had been some dramatic moments.

"Everything would seem all right one day, then I would suddenly be confronted with family crises or fears about dreadful illnesses. I just had to calm people down."

There were other trying occa-sions. In the early 90s, Dr Whittle spoke out about the sewage prob-lem in Porthleven, after he had treated swimmers for what he thought were sewage-related ill-nesses nesses

Security was also stepped up more recently after a violent inci-dent in the surgery – thankfully, the only one he can remember occurring there.

He laments the fact that a grill now separates the reception desk from the waiting room.

His proudest moments include detecting skin cancer at an early stage, and performing a skin graft before it became too serious, something he describes as "very satisfying

He is also pleased to see more patients seeking advice about ill-nesses that they have heard or read about.

"The vast majority of people take a very reasoned view. I think it is possible to guide them in practical ways in order to deal with their anxieties.

"Most people are very content to be told they do not need treatment and will go off and do what they can to make themselves better. I haven't needed to do a lot of finger wagging," he said.

He was also heartened by patients in the waiting room who would voluntarily give priority to others, if they were in distress. He cited several examples of patients allowing crying babies to join the front of the queue.

In retirement, Dr Whittle is hoping to embark on an ecology pro-ject near his home and, in doing so, will devote his time to caring for a different form of life.

He remembers with affection Porthleven residents who have told him they look up at his house on the hill above Porthleven, and say, "Goodnight doctor"

Perhaps some have now added, "and goodbye".







#### Mum returns to scene of tragedy

A WOMAN who lost her three-year-old son and boyfriend in a tragic accident at Porthleven in 1994 last week returned to the scene of the disaster.

Nicky Shipman, 25, whose son, Martin, was swept off the pier by a huge wave, went to the harbour on Friday, following the settlement of a civil claim against the Porthleven Harbour and Dock company.

Miss Shipman's boyfriend, Eddie Peacock, 23, died when he jumped into the sea in a coura-geous effort to save her son, but was knocked unconscious on rocks by the ferocious waves. Martin died in intensive care at Treliske Hospital, 48 hours after being swept into the sea on February 27.

The family had been walking along the pier to watch a spectacularly stormy sea.

Following the tragedy, Miss Shipman and members of Mr Peacock's family raised funds to place warning signs and a lifebelt on the pier. At the time of the accident, Miss Shipman

spoke of her anger at there being nothing on the pier she could throw to her son and boyfriend who were struggling in the heavy seas

Her lawyer, Graham Cole, said this week she hoped no-one would ever have to suffer what she had been through.

"She was determined such a thing would not happen again. She wanted to make sure some good would come out of the tragedy," he said.

Miss Shipman, who lives in the Porthleven area, said on Friday she had found it traumatic to go back to the pier.

Mr Cole would not reveal the financial settlement, and Trevor Osborne, the owner of the Harbour and Dock company, was unavailable for comment.

#### Porthleven Gala Week Management Committee.

The Lease of Gala Parc Recreation Ground and Bowling Green granted to the Porthleven Gala Week Management Committee by the former Helston Borough Council expired in 1986. Since that time continuous efforts have been made to determine which local authority, Kerrier District Council, Helston Town Council or Porthleven Town Council would ultimately have control of the land involved. It is pleasing to note from the current issue of the Town Council's 'Community News' that this has at long last been resolved. As we understand it the Porthleven Town Council now has direct control of all the land purchased by the efforts of the Gala Week Committee in the early 1950s.

In view of this, and the fact that the Town Council has negotiated leases with Porthleven AFC and Porthleven Bowling Club respectively, and the knowledge that the Cricket Club also has a Lease on the ground they occupy, the Management Trustees have decided that the balance of funds held by them should now be transferred to the Porthleven Town Council.

As this money was raised entirely by Porthleven people it is handed over on the understanding that it will be used in due course for, or towards some project which will be of interest and benefit to all Porthleven inhabitants.

It should be pointed out that this money has been held in reserve until such time as the protracted negotiations regarding control of the land was finalised.

For record purposes it is worthy to note the important part Porthleven people, old and young, played in helping to create and maintain recreational facilities of the highest order over a span of forty years from 1946 to 1986 without any charge on local rates.

The Gala Parc Recreation Ground, Bowling Green, Cricket Ground and the amenities area is a lasting tribute to their initiative, enterprise and achievement.

On behalf of the Gala Week Management Trustees I have pleasure in handing over this cheque for £3,439.17 representing the balance of Gala Week and Gala Week Management Committe funds.

It is requested that publicity be given to this letter in full in the next issue of the Town Council's 'Community News'.



The heat made the beer tent very



ALTHOUGH Andrew Adams (above), a Porthleven lad, is living away from home due to his work, he still has the local RNLI and Lifeboat Day very much at heart.

Lifeboat Day very much at neart. Andy, who has a Diploma in Fitness Training and Sports Therapy, is now sitting an exam for his Master's Diploma. He works at Brooklands Health Track in Weybridge, Surrey, where he also runs his own Karate Club.

Not being able to come home for Lifeboat Day, he decided he would attempt to lift the weight of the Mabel Alice, all 32 tons, in one workout. This he did in 28 minutes and 25 seconds, watched by several members. He then did a row of 5,000 metres on a rowing machine, and got several members to join in rowing the number of miles that the Mabel Alice did last year in call-outs. This was greatly enjoyed by all.

Andrew was able to collect \$83.77 for his efforts, and this was passed on to the treasurer of Porthleven and District Lifeboat committee when they met recently.

### Harbour's 'Star' attraction goes for an overhaul

FOR the last two years the large white hull of the "Southern Star" has been a feature of Porthleven. Tied up on the western side of the harbour, the ship towered above the local boats and has become something of a tourist attraction in the busy, picturesque, fishing village.


The "Southern Star" was built by Carrington Slipway of Tomago, NS Wales, in Australia in 1973 for the Australian Government and for Aboriginal Affairs. It was used as a patrol vessel along the Barrier Reef taking supplies to lighthouses and such.

In 1988 it was sold to the Falklands Government and sailed to Port Stanley where she received a massive refit to convert to a passenger ship. The Falklands Government de-cided to try to enhance their economy by encouraging tourism. The migration of birds around the Falklands was considered to be a huge attraction for bird watchers, but the scheme was doomed to failure as the cost of actually getting to the Falkland Islands was quite prohibitive. Also the weather is always bad and it would have made travel impossible at times getting from island to island.

During 1996 the "Southern Star" spent a year in the Cape Verde islands as a support ship for archaeological diving. The divers worked from the ship exploring wrecks in the area. The ship is 116' length, 26' beam with a 7'draft. She has twin screw Kelvin engines giving 440 BHP. She carries a crew of six and has accomodation for 20 passengers such as divers or scientists.

There is room for 110 tons of cargo and 40 tons of refrigerated cargo. The owners are J McGee and Part-

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ners Ltd of Great Yarmouth in Norfolk and Mr McGee was kind enough to give an exclusive interview on the history of the ship.

The local engineering company Fathomer engineering have been acting as agents for the "Southern Star" during the two years she has been moored in Porthleven. They are a sub sea engineering business who also run the Porthleven Wreck Centre. They have expressed their appreciation to Porthleven Harbour and Dock company and to Captain Ken Milburn, the Porthleven Harbour Master.

A huge crowd of local visitors watched the boat taken across the harbour on Friday August 21 1998 in preparation for her departure on the high tide of Saturday. Local fishing boats co-operated by leaving their usual moorings to give sufficient rooms for the manoeuvre, and one even gave a gentle nudge to the larger ship to give a little assistance.

er ship to give a little assistance. Captain Milburn is a Master Mariner who was used to much larger ships in his merchant naval career and he will skipper the ship on her brief journey to Falmouth where her refit will be completed and where she will await her next commission. The owners have no set plans as yet but will expect to get work in the survey sector possibly in oil surveying or as a diver support ship.

A surprisingly large crowd of several hundred people turned up at the harbour in the darkness ready to see the "Southern Star" make her exit through the 31 foot gap in the harbour entrance. As dawn broke the big ship slipped her moorings and edged towards to gap. With little to spare on either side she gently sqeezed through to the cheers and applause of the crowd.


The people hurried to the end of

the pier to wave farewell to the ship which had become such a fixture in Porthleven harbour and the harbour seemed strangely empty without her tall white presence. The "Southern Star" will be missed by many of the people who came in the early light of dawn to wish her well.





Once again it is my duty and pleasure, as Chairman of the Porthleven Committee, to welcome you to our annual LIFEBOAT DAY. We hope you have an enjoyable and memorable time. The lifeboat you will see is the Mabel Alice from Penlee, an Arun Class boat, 52 feet in length and has a crew of 7, all volunteers. The Mabel Alice and her crew supply an all year round service weather conditions.

weather conditions. Anyone who has experienced a winter storm on this coast line can hold nothing but admiration for the crew, their boat and the services offered by the RNLL. A lifeboat is a specially designed craft for saving life from the unforgiving sea. It will survive storms in which other vessels flounder. Today we see the most modern lifeboats in service around our coastline. giving their crews a greater degree of confidence in their vessels than their predecessors had in open boats powered by oars. Today's crews are part of a Brotherhood and comradeship second to none. One only has to read a little of the RNLI history to receive an insight into their dangerous and demanding, yet satisfying through their daring and resolve bring hope for rescue and life in times of certain disaster. If you have ever had the fortune to talk to any member of a lifeboat crew, you will find them the Today there does not exist a single class of sea going vessel which has not been helped by the RNLL.

RNLI. The Royal National Lifeboat Institution was founded by Sir William Hillary in 1824, whilst residing on the Isle of Man. Since that time over 129,500 lives have been saved by the RNLI. This organisation is totally dependant on voluntary donations as its only source of income and it is estimated that it will cost approximately £70 million pounds this year to maintain this life saving of the RNLI to those in peril on the seas. Porthleven RNLI day was founded in 1976 by Stan Lloyd and a group of fishermen led by Herble become involved and enjoy themselves. Since that date we have raised over £56,618 on lifeboat this has enabled us to send a further £2000 pa to the ad office for the saving of lives at sea. 



THE HELICOPTER

The Helicopter partaking in today's display is a Sea King Mk 5 from 771 Squadron RNAS Culdrose.

It is equipped for its role of SAR [ Search and Rescue ].

The aircraft has a crew of 5. Two pilots, an Observer, a Winch man and a Diver.

The diver is trained to jump from a height of 20 feet, with air bottles, and to submerge immediately.

The Squadron is manned by 9 pilots, 1 observer 5 SAR divers, 4 aircrewmen and over 60 maintenance crew.


They cover the South West approaches up to a distance of 250 miles from their base and offer a 365 day cover as do the RNLI.

The task of the Squadron is varied. It can range from lifting farm animals having fallen over a cliff to airlifting injured seamen and transporting them to hospital. From assisting in disasters at sea such as the 1979 Fastnet Race to helping in the Air India crash in 1985.

THE COXSWAIN OF THE LIFEBOAT STOOD ON THE HARBOUR WALL HE SENSED THE STORM WAS COMING THE BAROMETER BEGAN TO FALL BEFORE THIS NIGHT IS OVER I'LL TELL 'E' WITHOUT A DOUBT SOME POOR SOUL WILL NEED THE BOAT WE'RE BOUND TO GET A SHOUT. AS THE LAST MAN LEFT THE SHIP HE WAS HEARD TO SAY THANK GOODNESS FOR THE RNLL AND ALL THE LIVES THEY SAVE. THE CREWS ARE HEROES ONE AND ALL THIS WE MUST AGREE BUT WITHOUT D ours WHERE WOULD THE LIFEBOATS BE AND WHAT OF STRICKEN VESSELS UPON THE STORMY SEAS WHOSE ONLY HOPE OF RESCUE COME FROM YOU AND ME.










#### RNLI - FACT -CORNWALL - FACT - PORTHLEVEN - FACT -

The RNL1 undertakes to provide Search And Rescue requirements up to 80.46 kilometres (50 miles) out from the coast of the United Kingdom and the Republic of Ireland, whatever the weather, time, or day.

There are 274 lifeboat stations around the coasts of Britain and Ireland which launch more than 5,000 times a year. There is also a relief fleet of 100 boats. The lifeboats range in size from the latest Severn class costing  $\pounds$ 1.4m to the small inflatable C class at  $\pounds$ 12,500.

On average 15 cries for help are answered every single day. In 1996 the average lives saved for the UK was 3 per day.

In 1995 Cornwall's lifeboats launched 328 launches resulting in 355 lives being saved. This is the equivalent of one third of the total lives saved in the UK coming from around Cornwall's coastline.

During the RNLI history the sea has claimed the lives of 437 lifeboat crew members.

Every type of sea going vessel has called upon the services of the RNLI.

A committee of volunteers administer the day to day running of each lifeboat station. Nearly every station with an 'all weather boat' has a full-time mechanic who is also a crew member. The remainder of the crew are all volunteers who earn their living in a variety of ways. Their skills and intimate knowledge of local waters and coastline are vital to a successful rescue.


The RNLI is one of the largest charitable organisations in the UK today costing over £50 million annually to maintain its level of service. Funds are always required to up-grade essential equipment.

Thanks to our supporters, Porthleven in its first year as an established branch was informed that the returns to HQ for the financial year 1995/6 amounted to the highest on record for a new branch in Cornwall.

The Lifeboat that you see here today is the Penlee Lifeboat " MABEL ALICE ". (Affectionately known as "The Able Mabel" )

She is an ARUN CLASS lifeboat, 52 feet long and carrying a crew of 7.

Powered by 2 Caterpillar diesel engines of over 500 h.p., each giving a top speed of 18 knots she has a range of 230 miles and operates up to a distance of 30 miles from shore

The Mabel Alice, like all lifeboats can be called into action any time of the day or night providing a 24 hour service for every day of the year.

She has one full time engineer but the rest, including the Coxswain, are volunteers from all walks of life. The crews go to the rescue of people in distress in sea conditions ranging from a flat calm to hurricane force winds and mountainous seas. A third of all rescues are carried out in total darkness.

The money to build Mabel Alice was donated by the late Sir David Robinson and named after his wife. He gave the money to provide a replacement boat when the Solomon Browne was lost with all hands answering a distress call in December 1981.



over £64,000 has been sent to the RNLI with your compliments. The highest figure raised by this branch was in the year 1986 when over £3,700 was


raised. Let us see if we can make 1997 even larger. Once again, this year we decided to hold lifeboat day on a Sunday so that more visitors

would have the opportunity to see the lifeboats and the Search and Rescue Helicopters from 771 Squadron in action.








